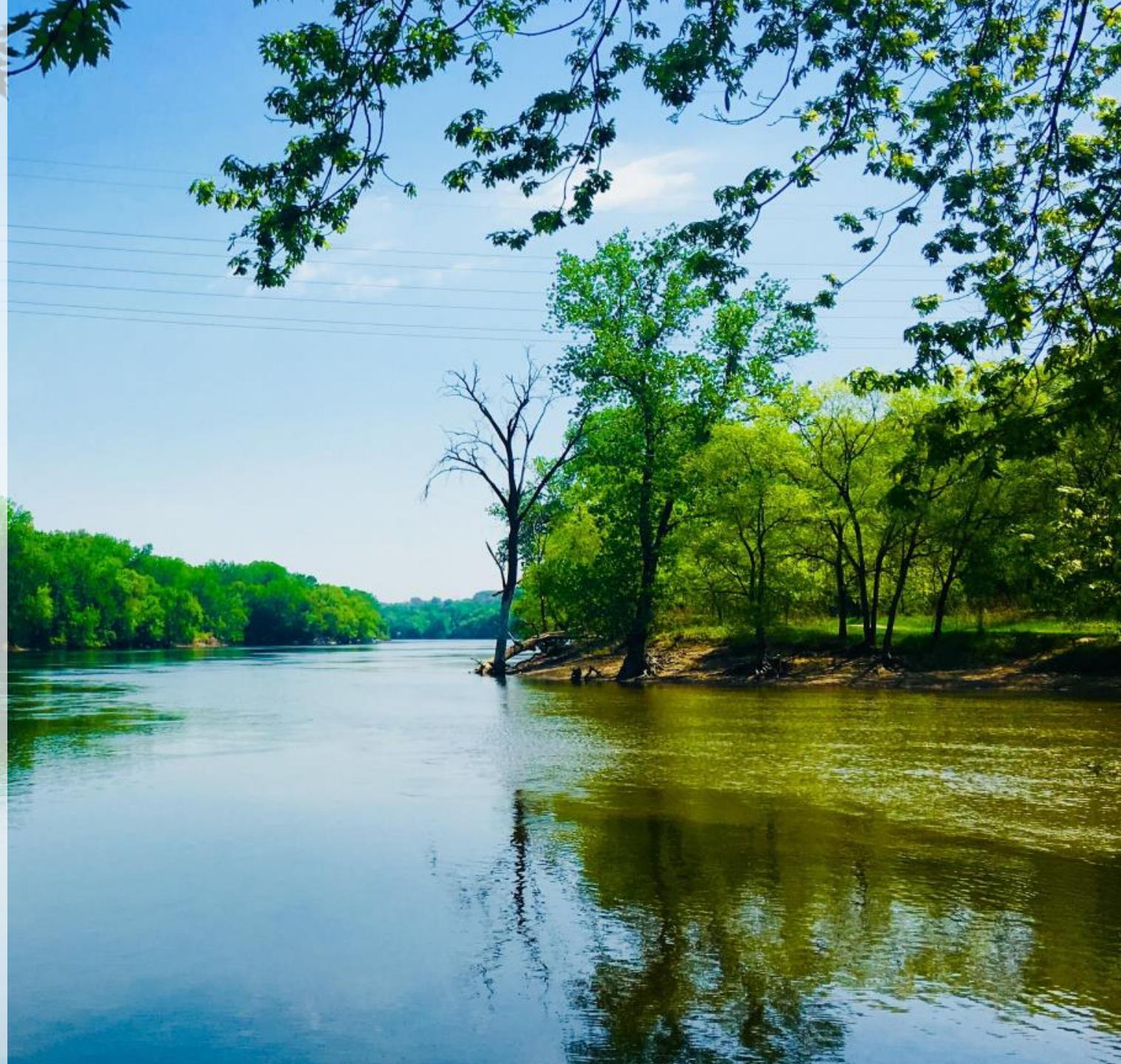

- In Minnesota there are 60,000 American Indian people and 11 federally recognized tribes





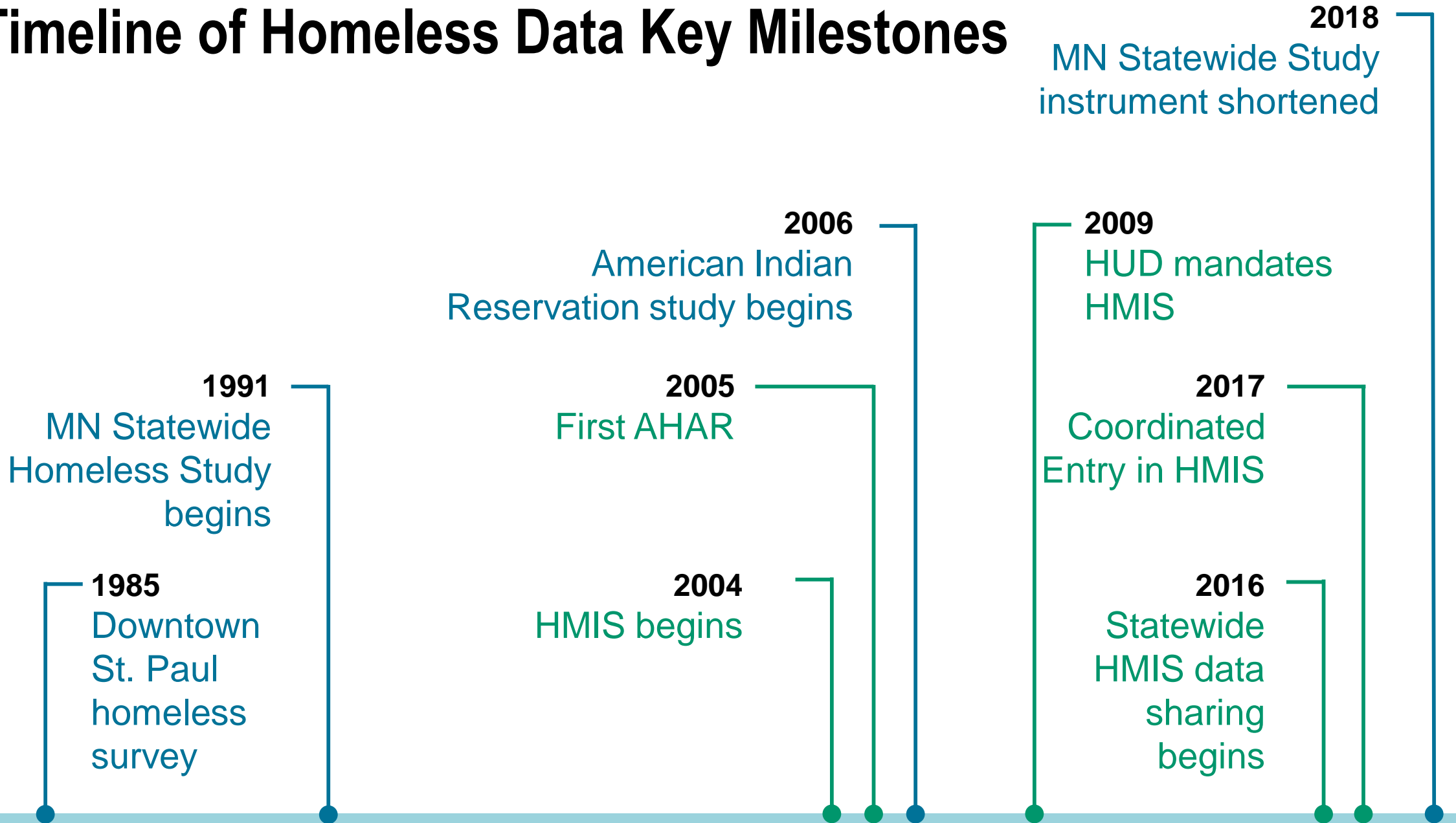

Pros and Cons of Key Homeless Data Sources

	MN Homeless Study	HUD Point in Time Count (PIT)	HMIS
Frequency:	Every 3 years	Every year	Continuous
Method:	45 min face-to-face facilitated interview	HMIS + short survey of unsheltered	Data entered at provider locations
Strengths:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *In-depth information *Historical trends 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *National/inter-state comparisons *Updated annually 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Unique IDs for return clients *Common/consistent data *“Real-time” data
Limitations:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Low frequency of implementation *Undercounts shorter-term homelessness 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Implementation varies across the state *Methodology has changed *Undercounts shorter-term homelessness 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Rigid, mandated system *Data entry challenges *Limited coverage of unsheltered

Minnesota Homeless Study

- Statewide study lead by Wilder Research every 3 years since 1991
 - In-depth interviews in 300+ shelters, programs, and outreach sites across MN
 - Point-in-time census count
 - 1,000 volunteer interviewers
- Mix of private and public funding
- **Next study is October 2021!**

Minnesota Homeless Study

What can study data tell us?

- In-depth characteristics of people experiencing homelessness in Minnesota
- Needs among those experiencing homelessness
- Investigate trends over time (1991 to 2018)
- What other specific research questions need to be explore (via special analysis or raw data request)

Minnesota Homeless Study

Common breakdown of data

- Geographic (Statewide, Greater MN, Metro, CoC Region)
- Interview location (in shelter vs. non-shelter)
- Shelter type (Emergency, Domestic Violence, Transitional)
- Gender (Male, Female, Self-identify)



How to Find Homeless Study Data

Homeless Study Data: What's Available?

- Tables and reports at mnhomeless.org
 - Data tables detailing **counts** of those experiencing homelessness
 - Data tables detailing **face-to-face interview** responses
 - Overall report on homelessness in Minnesota
 - Topic- and region-specific reports
- Data requests and special analyses





Using Homeless Study Data to Support Your Work
